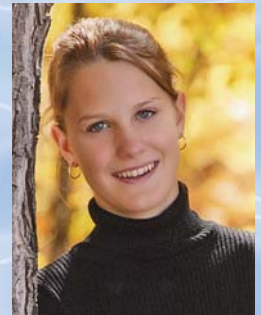

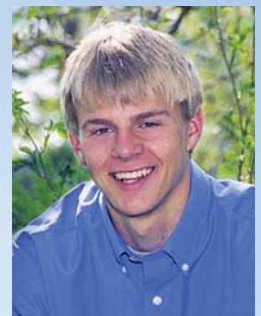

3. Age 25 or younger.
